## From the desk of Partor Sue Obson

I chose this passage to share with you this month to invite you to reflect on the mighty power of the cross of Christ. As we journey together through Lent toward our joyful Easter Celebrations, we must never forget what Christ did for us and why "he chose the nails," to quote Max Lucado. Paul calls us to "be of one mind and purpose," not to discourage us from expressing our differences on things that matter to us, but to encourage us to work towards harmony in the church. Little differences are up for debate and we seem to love to engage in discourse over some pretty small stuff. It's the big stuff Paul is writing about in this letter.

And that big stuff is Jesus Christ who willingly participated in God's plan of salvation for humanity. Pastor Bob and I love to tell the story of the life of Jesus; we plant the seeds in your heart, and when you worship at church, read and study the bible, hear and sing songs, and participate in the life of your church family, you are watering and fertilizing these seeds. It is God, in the Holy Spirit, that makes your faith grow. We look to the empty cross and sing joyfully on Easter morning, knowing that death had no power over Jesus. Without faith, all we would see are two pieces of wood. With faith, we see love, grace, mercy, forgiveness, life everlasting, and great sacrifice on our behalf flowing from the cross.

This gathering of people we call church is not an amazing, wonderful place just because we are so amazing. (Well, we are!) It is not Bob's church; it is not Sue's church. It is not even your church! It is God's church! So how do we stay of one mind and purpose? Look to the cross and let it guide you. Remember who you belong to; remember who died on that cross for the sins of all.

Yet, clearly the Spirit of God has been moving and carrying the family of God that is LLLC! Congregational Event # 1 brought a wonderful esprit de corps and multiple insights into the long life of Long Lake Lutheran. Of all the epiphanies that came during this wonderful (even if 'rushed' and timebound) shared experience led by the Transition Team was RESILIENCY! The Spirit of God has carried LLLC through storm and fire, climactic and emotional and brought us out alive and kicking! Its not so much that LLLC 'skated' through it all... more like 'plowed' with determination and 'endured' with the power of the Holy Spirit.

God had and has hope-filled "plans for our welfare." God brought faithful and loving shepherds to LLLC in the past and God will do so again. Half to a dozen Swedish farm families came together with the Spirit to birth this congregation. Now the Spirit calls US ALL together to bring new birth into a new season of ministry and mission and mutual caregiving and compassionate outreach locally through our LLLC parish ministries and regionally and worldwide through mission partnerships and extensional ministries with the MPLS Synod and the ELCA.

Faithful Council, Transition Team, lay leader members, faithful staff, and families of all ages keep LLLC on course with the "plans God has for us." We do so, "calling on God in prayer" to continue guiding us forward, keeping us hope-filled and in unity, practicing "speaking the truth in love" and exercising grace and tolerance and respect for one another. The Spirit keeps calling and empowering us to set aside personal agenda, ambition and privilege of entitlement for the sake of blessing the whole body of Christ in humility with what is best for LLLC.

In the days, weeks, and months to come... let us be found faithful, faithful to our Lord Jesus Christ and faithful to one another and the plans God has for us. Let us be found seeking the will of out Lord by praying together always, "Thy will be done, Lord... here at LLLC as it is in heaven!" Let's be found giving out Lord "the best of us" as God as given the best to us in Christ Jesus. Especially, let us be in prayer for Pastor Sue Olson for her future in Ordained Ministry and as an internal candidate for Call to LLLC.

In the coming weeks the Council will be calling the members of LLLC together as early as Tuesday evening, April 2 to seek how God's plans will unfold for us. Traditions and Rituals

Tradition and rituals. There is something very comforting about them isn't there? Easter is coming up, and there are definitely some traditions and rituals that my family hold dear, many of which have been held over from my own childhood.

Every year we make and decorate a bunny cake. This is something we did when I was growing up, and something that I now do with my own family and niece and nephew. My kids are 14 and 16 and we will still make a bunny cake this year, because it is tradition! The year my kids don't want to make a bunny cake with me will probably break my heart!

New outfits for Easter Sunday – when I was growing up we always got a new outfit to wear on Easter Sunday, and for some reason I almost always feel like this is something we need to do, so most likely, my crew will end up wearing a brand new outfit to church on Easter Sunday, because it is tradition.

We have always done Easter egg hunts – now that isn't an unusual tradition I know, but when our kids were young we modified how we did our hunts. Since our kids were young each of the cousins were designated one color as their own and we hid the eggs accordingly. This worked well since there was a wider age span and otherwise the older cousins would end up with all the eggs! Every Easter it is fun to watch the cousins help each other find their eggs and work together -rather than race to compete to find the most eggs and it has worked well for us.

Finally, we always make sure we go to both Good Friday and Easter Sunday worship services. It is really hard to fully celebrate the joy of Easter, without feeling the sorrow of Good Friday. When my children were younger attending these services wasn't always easy. Having young children at a quiet Good Friday service can be a challenge, but it was an important tradition. I'll never forget the year my son, who was five years old at the time said very loudly "Mom, I can't believe Jesus dies again, he died last year!". This is the moment when I realized that teaching my children to whisper would be a very good thing.



As important as our tradition and rituals are to us, there have also been things that have changed over the years. We have relatives all over the place, and because I have a job in ministry, we are not always able to be with family on Easter, or when we would like to. This means that we have had to change our ideas of tradition when it comes to extended family celebrations, menus, and meals on Easter. Some years we have been able to be together, and some years we just can't – and we have learned that we can still have a meaningful celebration and still keep some of our most important traditions and rituals.

Long Lake has been going through a lot of changes recently. Change is hard. In the midst of all the hard changes Long Lake has been able to hold on to important rituals and traditions that make up the core of who Long Lake Lutheran is. At the last Transition Team meeting I walked away so impressed with hearing about how resilient and strong this congregation has been throughout challenges and changes over the years. This is something to celebrate! I pray that we can continue to hold each up in prayer as we navigate the changes and work to make Long Lake Lutheran a welcoming church for all! Thank you all for your continued partnership in ministry.

"Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me." —Psalm 51:10 (ESV)

As you refresh your space at the start of this new season, don't neglect the space inside—your very soul, the core of who you are. Here are three questions to ask yourself as you take a spiritual inventory.

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." —1 John 1:9

God is ready to give you a new start. Take the first step by seeking His forgiveness and asking for His direction as you move forward in your newfound freedom.

#### What Can You Give Away?

So often, we hold onto things we haven't used in years because *maybe* we'll need them one day. Or we feel an attachment to something and can't bear to release it to the donation pile.

#### A.A. Step By Step

#### STEP FOUR: Make a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves

The Fourth Step is necessary to continue the progress we made in the first three steps. The AA Big Book describes this specific course of action as "vigorous." We prepare an inventory of who we are, identifying the things we want to keep and those we want to change. This needs to be a searching and fearless moral inventory and not to be taken lightly. It is also important that it is written down and for a very different reason, kept somewhere where it is very, very safe.

Many of us assume that if we stop our addictive behavior our problems will be solved. Unfortunately, that's not true. By stopping the behavior, we did solve the problems directly related to the active addiction... no more DWI's for example. Other problems persisted, however. Resentments, rage, irresponsibility and isolation still created problems for us in recovery. Just because we quit using, didn't make the character defects go away.

"Liquor" says the AA Big Book was "but a symptom;" In recovery we had to deal with these character defects regardless of the nature of our addiction or compulsion.

The purpose of the Fourth Step is to identify those character defects. Writing it down forces us to confront what is really there. Our inventory is moral because it concerns our behavior. The purpose is not to humiliate or punish but to bring closure and freedom. This Step requires us to be vulnerable—to honestly examine our flaws and our fears.

Resentments play a large part and must be complete with name, action or cause of resentment and wrong behavior that contributed to the situation. We ignore the other person's wrongs, no matter what they were, and only look for our own mistakes that contributed to the situation. Were we selfish, dishonest, self-seeking? In other words, "where were we to blame?"

Next we review the fears we have and why we think we have them. Who do we owe money? Something we are afraid we might fail at or something someone said? Write it all down. We examine our sexual conduct over the past years. Whom have we hurt? Where were we at fault? What should we have done instead?

Then we review the Seven Deadly Sins of pride, greed, lust, anger, gluttony, envy and sloth (laziness). We examine each and list how they apply to us and how they have hurt us and others. In this group of defects we have the opportunity to look at grandiosity. Some examples may be: bragging, having to be right, always the center of attention, not willing to admit when wrong.

Once we have made a list of all our defects, we must make a list of our assets. Since facing reality is our goal, we need to accept our strengths, as well as our weaknesses.

Finally we must double-check to be sure we left nothing important out of our inventory and kept secrets. We want to be sure we have included everyone we have hurt by our conduct and that we were completely honest.

Do all these suggestions make for a very long Fourth Step? YES! But if we are both "searching and fearless" it can't be anything less. If properly done the Fourth Step is intensely painful and ego-deflating, bringing us face to face with what we have done and describes our addiction or compulsion in vivid detail, forcing us to face the need for change. Sometimes the hardest one to be honest with is ourselves.

Again as a reminder-when the Fourth Step is being written-keep it safely hidden. Don't' leave it on the computer, lying on a desk or where someone could just casually come upon it. It could be a disaster if a spouse, coworker, or child happens to find it. If it is done properly, you probably don't want to share it with the world.
