From the desk of Pastor Sue...

CHRISTIS RISEN HE IS RISEN INDED REPORT OF THE PROPERTY OF THE

We have waited a long time to say this out loud. 40 days of repentance and contemplative prayer during the Lenten Season is a long time to look inward. What a gift our God gave to us that we celebrate each Easter. In fact, each Sunday is a "little Easter!"

With a little "Googling", I found some interesting facts. The naming of the celebration as "Easter" seems to go back to the name of a pre-Christian goddess in England, Eostre, who was celebrated at the beginning of spring. The only reference to this goddess comes from the writings of the Venerable Bede, a British monk who lived in the late seventh and early eighth century.

Easter and the holidays that are related to it are *moveable feasts* which do not fall on a fixed date in the Gregorian or Julian calendars which follow only the cycle of the Sun; rather, its date is offset from the date of Passover and is therefore calculated based on a lunisolar calendar similar to the Hebrew calendar. The First Council of Nicaea (325) established two rules, independence of the Jewish calendar and worldwide uniformity, which were the only rules for Easter explicitly laid down by the council. No details for the computation were specified; these were worked out in practice, a process that took centuries and generated a number of controversies. It has come to be the first Sunday after the ecclesiastical full moon that occurs on or soonest after 21 March. Even if calculated on the basis of the more accurate Gregorian calendar, the date of that full moon sometimes differs from that of the astronomical first full moon after the March equinox.

So, if you are confused as to why Easter is a moveable feast, you are not alone. In 2020, Easter fell on April 12th. Next year it falls on April 17th, which seems quite late. The earliest possible date for Easter is March 22nd, and the latest possible date is April 25th. Easter can never come as early as March 21, however. That's because, by ecclesiastical rules, the vernal equinox is fixed on March 21.

Actually, however, all of that trivia is useless when we hold it up against the gift of salvation that we received from God in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Easter is linked to the Passover of the Angel of Death as recorded in Exodus. Jesus, as a practicing Jew, was in Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover and the festival of Unleavened Bread Feast. On Sunday, the beginning of what we now call Holy Week, Jesus rode with humility into one entrance gate of the old city, to the shouts of "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord—the King of Israel!" On Tuesday, he looked across the city and wept. On Wednesday, the preparations for Passover are begun. On Thursday, the disciples watch in awe as Jesus washes their feet; the last supper is shared; they go to the Garden of Gethsemene to pray; Judas betrays Jesus and leads the Roman soldiers to the garden; Jesus is arrested.

Jesus undergoes six trials, none of which find him guilty of any crime. The people, however, are calling for his crucifixion and Pilate gives in. Jesus is mocked, beaten, and is made to carry his own cross to the gate on the north side of the Holy City and hung to die. He is buried in a tomb. Just imagine the emotions of the disciples not knowing the rest of the story.

We know how this tragedy ended and so we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord every Easter. May you deeply feel the love of God who gave His only Son to die for you so that you may have eternal life. ¹⁶ "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life."

Strawberry Salad

For the Salad:

- 6 cups Spring Mix Salad
- 1 cup Strawberries sliced
- 1 cup Red Grapes halved
- 1/2 cup Candied Walnuts (recipe below) or plain walnuts, chopped
- 2 Tbsp Dried Cranberries chopped
 1/4 cup Feta Cheese crumbled

For the Dressing:

- 1/4 cup Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 1 large Lemon juiced (about 3 Tbsp)
- 2 tsp Honey or Maple Syrup
- 1 tsp Dijon Mustard
 1/8 tsp Kosher Salt




For the Candied Walnuts:

Place 1/2 cup WALNUTS and 1 Tbsp SUGAR (white or brown) in a small skillet over medium heat.

Stir the walnuts continuously until the sugar turns into a sticky liquid and coats the walnuts (about 5 minutes).

Remove walnuts from skillet and set on a baking sheet to cool.





Have you ever kept a diary or a journal? Several years ago, I came across a diary I had written in my pre-teen years and found it quite amusing. I have been an "on and off" again journal keeper for most of my life.

Many years ago I vowed to stop writing in my journals, because I was very afraid that anyone who found my journals and read them someday would think I was a very angry and unbalanced person! I was worried about this because my tendency was only to write in my journal when I was sad or angry. I wasn't the kind of journal writer who would keep a daily chronicle of my life-I just needed a safe outlet for the intense emotions I sometimes felt that I didn't really know what to do with. I must admit that this is one of the reasons I have been thankful for social media, I love the "memories" feature on social media that allows me to sometimes take a trip down memory lane, revisiting old memories of what I was doing at this time of year 1 year, 3 years or even 8 years ago. Whenever I get tempted to shut down my social media, it is these memories that tend to keep me there.

When It came to my journal keeping though, I had visions of my great-grandchildren discovering them and sharing stories of their "poor unbalanced" great-grandma and I quickly destroyed them and abandoned the practice. These were memories I didn't want to revisit each year. However, throughout my life, there have still been places where I have had to acknowledge that the written word has its place. In my daughter's pre-teen years, we had a mother/daughter journal that we passed back and forth. This written form of communication allowed for thoughts to brew and responses to percolate. Whenever the mood would strike, someone would write something in the journal, and you would know when there was a new entry to respond to when the journal would "show up" on your nightstand. It was a beautiful way that we developed of loving, listening to and blessing one another.

I have learned that there are other relationships in my life where I long for deeper connection and better ways to communicate. Sometimes I struggle with carving out the time and space to pray and connect with God in a deeper way. I have good intentions, but life always seems to get in the way. I know that in any good relationship – communication is the key to strengthening the relationship, but I don't always make the time for that communication. Sometimes I struggle with how to communicate with God, I don't know what to say, or how to say it. One of my favorite interviews with Mother Theresa was when someone asked her what she said when she prayed. Her response was. "Nothing, I just listen." The interviewer asked. "and what does God say?" "Nothing, he just listens." I don't think I allow the

space to listen. I talk to God, and I never pause to allow God to respond. I supply my own answers, because I am never patient enough to wait and listen. So, over the years, I have made it a practice to keep a prayer journal. I write all my prayers. I tell God what is on my heart, what I am struggling with, and what I am celebrating. Then I put in my nightstand and wait for God to answer. Sometimes, when I go back and reread my entries, I am shocked at the ways God has responded. What I know for sure is it has slowed me down and forced me to start listening. The book on my nightstand also continued to remind me that taking the time to communicate is half the battle.

A.A. Step By Step: Step Four

STEP FOUR Make a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves

The Fourth Step is necessary to continue the progress we made in the first three steps. The AA Big Book describes this specific course of action as "vigorous." We prepare an inventory of who we are, identifying the things we want to keep and those we want to change. This needs to be a searching and fearless moral inventory and not to be taken lightly. It is also important that it is written down and for a very different reason, kept somewhere where it is very, very safe.

Many of us assume that if we stop our addictive behavior our problems will be solved. Unfortunately, that's not true. By stopping the behavior, we did solve the problems directly related to the active addiction... no more DWI's for example. Other problems persisted, however. Resentments, rage, irresponsibility and isolation still created problems for us in recovery. Just because we quit using, didn't make the character defects go away.

"Liquor" says the AA Big Book was "but a symptom;" In recovery we had to deal with these character defects regardless of the nature of our addiction or compulsion.

The purpose of the Fourth Step is to identify those character defects. Writing it down forces us to confront what is really there. Our inventory is moral because it concerns our behavior. The purpose is not to humiliate or punish but to bring closure and freedom. This Step requires us to be vulnerable—to honestly examine our flaws and our fears.

Resentments play a large part and must be complete with name, action or cause of resentment and wrong behavior that contributed to the situation. We ignore the other person's wrongs, no matter what they were, and only look for our own mistakes that contributed to the situation. Were we selfish, dishonest, self-seeking? In other words, "where were we to blame?"

Next we review the fears we have and why we think we have them. Who do we owe money? Something we are afraid we might fail at or something someone said? Write it all down. We examine our sexual conduct over the past years. Whom have we hurt? Where were we at fault? What should we have done instead?

Then we review the Seven Deadly Sins of pride, greed, lust, anger, gluttony, envy and sloth (laziness). We examine each and list how they apply to us and how they have hurt us and others. In this group of defects we have the opportunity to look at grandiosity. Some examples may be: bragging, having to be right, always the center of attention, not willing to admit when wrong.

Once we have made a list of all our defects, we must make a list of our assets. Since facing reality is our goal, we need to accept our strengths, as well as our weaknesses.

Finally we must double-check to be sure we left nothing important out of our inventory and kept secrets. We want to be sure we have included everyone we have hurt by our conduct and that we were completely honest.

Do all these suggestions make for a very long Fourth Step? YES! But if we are both "searching and fearless" it can't be anything less. If properly done the Fourth Step is intensely painful and ego-deflating, bringing us face to face with what we have done and describes our addiction or compulsion in vivid detail, forcing us to face the need for change. Sometimes the hardest one to be honest with is ourselves.

Again as a reminder-when the Fourth Step is being written-keep it safely hidden. Don't' leave it on the computer, lying on a desk or where someone could just casually come upon it. It could be a disaster if a spouse, co-worker, or child happens to find it. If it is done properly, you probably don't want to share it with the world. AA Big Book
