## From the desk of Pastor Sue



Luke 2:1-20

2 In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be

registered. 2 This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. 3 All went to their own towns to be registered. 4 Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. 5 He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. 6 While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. 7 And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

8 In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. 9 Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. 10 But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: 11 to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah,[a] the Lord. 12 This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." 13 And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, [b] praising God and saying,

14 "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"[c]

15 When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." 16 So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. 17 When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; 18 and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. 19 But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. 20 The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

My wish for you is that you spend time this Advent in anticipation of the coming Messiah, that you don't rush through the season. Enjoy the time of waiting by attending Advent services, reading the Christmas story as reported by Matthew and Luke. Dwell in the words of John as they describe the Word who was with God and was God. And pray. Pray for your faith family, for Long Lake Lutheran Church and our brothers and sisters in our sister synod in Nigeria. Think before you buy. Remember the hard working folks who make those products and only buy from sources you know are fair to their employees and that employees are safe from harm. Be kind to the service workers and cashiers as their lives are not always as comfortable as yours. Remember the 8000 homeless men and women in our state. Contribute extra out of your abundance if you are able to our mission requests.

If you are able to share out of your abundance this Christmas, I would like to recommend the ministries that Long Lake Lutheran and your Missions Team, along with the ELCA and the Minneapolis Area Synod, support. Devotions: Rachel – Shared a wonderful Veterans Day music program--a connection with our Stewardship theme of our land and people-Being thankful and caring for each other.

#### Technology Update -Bruce Yurich

Bruce shared an inventory spreadsheet with the team to determine needs, prioritizing, plan, and budget. He had a quote from TCNet for \$1620 for placing in ground cable needed to connect Wi-Fi in the cornerstone. We asked if technology team would submit a RFP to council. Bruce will send the inventory spreadsheet to staff for updating. Much discussion on understanding phase 1, phase 2 etc., and time frames and financial support. Pastor Sue's computer is in need to be replaced. This was budgeted for 2021-recommedation and quotes will be obtained. Pastor Sue will ask for a quote/bid to have someone local to review computers for any immediate improvements. This may be a bridge until we receive technology recommedations.

#### Staff Reports and Team Reports-

Thanks to the teams who were able to send reports prior to meeting. Recommended to bypass discussion due to time with technology and remaining agenda items.

#### **ONGOING** (recurring items)

**Discuss COVID variant** – Current numbers were shared with team. There is an increase of positive COVID in surrounding areas. We will continue to be aware and use CDC/MDH for guidance of exposures. Pastor Sue will be meeting with Isanti County for planning a day to use our site for vaccination.

**Personnel**-Office Admin Update-Rachel began November 1st and has been a great addition to our office staff. Personnel team completed annual reviews with staff. Personnel team will be reviewing handbook and preparing recommendations for 2022 budget.

**Visioning-** Pastor Sue shared notes/data collected during meetings. She will share this with the planning team. Team discussed a "value audit" and felt this would be beneficial for a separate meeting or possibly for a retreat. It was shared that at the beginning of 2020, council team participated in an all-day session of reviewing the roles and needs of the church.

Mom's Cows Cleaning- Mary's surgery was cancelled. Therefore, no interruption with cleaning services.

#### OLD BUSINESS

Reps needed for next year- We will be looking for 4 council reps for next year. Three chairs are for 3 year commitments and 1 chair is for a 2 year commitment.

New Council Meeting Time- Finance and Property were not able to discuss this last month. They will discuss later this month at the Property/finance meeting.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

Celebration for Jen-Personnel team will be doing an exit interview with Jen. We will celebrate Jen on Sunday 11/28 with cake.

**Budget-** Discussion of "who" oversees empty chair budgets. This falls under the Finance team due to their overall view of the budget. ## A.A. Step By Step

Step Twelve

"Havi ng had a spiritual awakeni ng as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these pri nciples i n all our affairs."

The results of a spiritual awakening are dramatic, although they may take place over a long period of time. They indicate changed perception, attitudes and behaviors. There are many definitions of a spiritual awakening. With each person the important meaning of it is that he has now become able to do, feel and believe that which he could not do before on his own strength. He finds himself in possession of a degree of peace of mind, honesty, tolerance and love he felt incapable of before. What he has received is a free gift. This gift lies in the practice of "ALL" the Twelve Steps in the program. In the beginning of AA, Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob felt the only way they would stay "safe" was to "get active" and work with other alcoholics. They felt

they must carry AA's message. That was the main reason the fellowship existed. AA is more than a set of principles; it is a society of recovered alcoholics in action. Twelfth Step work is one of the actions we take to stay in recovery. Our own faith is strengthened when we help another. Our message is one of hope, love, comfort, health. A better way of life. How can anyone argue with that? It works! How do we carry it out? In subtle, but powerful ways. We do our own recovery work and become living demonstrations of hope, self-love, comfort and health. These quiet behaviors send a powerful message.

Our Higher Power will guide our actions to where we need to be to spread the message. If another person is helped, it is by the grace of

God and not by what we say or do. And finally we strengthen our own faith and sobriety by doing Twelve Step work. Action is the key word. We experience a kind of giving that asks no rewards. We begin to practice all Twelve Steps of the program in our daily lives to find emotional sobriety. This offers us a kind of love that has no price tag. Working with other alcoholics will insure immunity from drinking. This is what Bill Wilson realized when he founded AA; that nothing kept alcoholics sober better than another alcoholic. That is Twelve Step Work! Twelve Step Work is essential to keeping the AA Fellowship going. Twelve Step Work means to carry the message to those that still suffer. Am I carrying the message by example or just giving advice? Have I experienced a spiritual awakening? How can I carry the message to my family members? How it Works, Paths to Recovery, Touchstone,
