

Shawna Berg, Director of Youth and Family Ministries



It is Lent, for many years I engaged in the practice of giving up something for Lent. This seemed like the "thing" to do, but then I realized it wasn't really doing a lot for my faith journey.

When thinking about a Lenten discipline, I think it is important to consider things that will help you focus on what Lent is really about. I think it is helpful to possibly add a discipline like prayer, daily devotions, or intentional ways of serving or giving to others.

Maybe what we should be giving up during Lent is **time and things** that are getting in the way of our relationship with God?

Here are some thing I have tried that have been helpful over the years:

- 1. **Pray your way through Lent** For a few years I prayed through my Facebook Friend list for Lent. This was a powerful experience for me. I divided my list into 40 days and before each day I sent a personal message to each person asking for their prayer requests. If they sent me a personal request, I prayed for that. If they didn't, I lifted up general prayers for that person. This opened up some amazing conversations with people.
- 2. Write 40 letters Write a letter to 40 people who have made a significant influence on you (one a day for each day in Lent). If 40 is overwhelming to you or to young children, write 6 one each week during Lent.
- 3. Read through one of the Gospels in 40 days
- 4. Attend a weekly Lenten worship service
- 5. **Drink only water through Lent** Figure out how much money you would have spent on other beverages (coffee, soda, etc.) and donate that money to a charity that provides clean water to a place that needs it.

Liturgy? Why Do We Need That?

Again, Liturgy is "the work of the people." Every word of it comes from scripture. It has roots in tradition, history, and culture. We are called to live our Christian life in community with other believers, not in isolation. There are many kinds of worship practiced these days. I will summarize some of them briefly.

Emotion-Driven: Worship serves to provide an experience. The emphasis is on the individual's relationship to God rather than participation in an experience with others. Songs are not chosen for theological content, but rather to set a mood and tone for experiencing the presence of God. Emphasis is on the heart rather than the mind. Outward signs of this emotion driven worship are: crying, raising of hands, falling to one's knees, cry-strict about work or amusement on the Sabbath. ing out words. People "give their lives to Christ" and the emphasis is on conversion. There is often a stage, lighting, and performers. The congregation is the audience.

Morally-Driven: "Deeds, not creeds." The message of Jesus is reduced to moralistic instruction on how to live, with an emphasis on love. It focuses more on societal change. Jesus is the new Moses, the new law giver. The type of worship means that the service is not centered on what God does for sinners, but instead is centered on what people do for God and the world around them.

Seeker-Driven: This is a fairly new approach to worship aimed primarily at non-believers. It is an attractional model; it aims to make the worship space attractive to unbelievers. There is more entertainment and less participation involved. The present big productions, loud music, videos, sermons about movies. They are hoping that an unbeliever will be attracted to this style and desire to attend, making an eventual decision about becoming a Christian. Sermons are not theological, but more basic and entertaining.

Roman Catholic: At the heart of the Roman Catholic tradition is the sacrifice of the Mass. The central act of worship is the Holy Eucharist, or Communion. The Eucharist is to be sacrificed on the altar where the bread and wine are "transubstantiated" or changed into the true body and blood of Christ. The priest functions before God on behalf of the church. Roman Catholicism does not affirm the "priesthood" of all believers that we do. The worship service is centered on the acts of the priests.

Reformed: This would be Presbyterian, Dutch Reformed, and other Calvinist churches. They emphasize the glory of God in worship. Christians are to do in worship only those things which God has commanded in the New Testament. The service is very plain. "Four bare walls and a sermon." No artwork, no pictures of Jesus. They are pretty

LUTHERAN WORSHIP: It's what we do! Our worship is a back and forth dialog between God and us! We confess our unworthiness; God shows us grace and mercy and forgives us. Then we respond with thanksgiving and praise. Worship isn't about us, but about God. We are in need of the words of grace. At the center of our worship is the grace which God gives us unconditionally. Emotion does not drive our service, nor does entertainment. It is ok to give way to some of those elements on occasion, but it is not the driving force of our worship. The center of our worship is God's gifts to sinners. We do not believe the Eucharist is a sacrifice on the altar, but rather Christ died once for all. Christ died once for all! I can't say it enough! The Lord's Supper is God's gift to us, not our offering to God.

In conclusion, there are many, many ways to worship. They are not wrong, just different. I love being a Lutheran; I love the traditions, the liturgy, and the songs. But, most of all, I love the message. God's grace is sufficient. I am enough! God loves and forgives us and accepts us just as we are.


