# Sue Olson

From the desk of Pastor Sue...

Have you ever wondered about these wise men? Were they wise men or kings? Why did they bring the gifts they did to Jesus? What did Joseph and Mary do with the gifts? And what are frankincense and myrrh, anyway?

Matthew 2:1-12 New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)

2 In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, <sup>2</sup> asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star

at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." <sup>3</sup> When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; <sup>4</sup> and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. <sup>5</sup> They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: <sup>6</sup> 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

for from you shall come a ruler

who is to shepherd my people Israel.""

<sup>7</sup> Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. <sup>8</sup> Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." <sup>9</sup> When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. <sup>10</sup> When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. <sup>11</sup> On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and



they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. <sup>12</sup> And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Ideas about the origins and significance of the wise men developed over many centuries through writings of early theologians. Early Christians looked to Old Testament prophecies to see how they predicted events in Jesus' life. The interpretations and mystic visions became embellished through legends, plays, art and music over time.

At the time of Jesus' birth, certain priests watched for signs of the Messiah's arrival as prophesied in the Hebrew Bible, or Old Testament. Early texts of the New Testament, written in Greek described Jesus' visitors as magi or "Wise men". Magi were priestly magicians or philosophers who studied astrology and were believed to have occult powers. Matthew does not say how many magi there were, except we know that "magi" is a plural noun in Greek; the singular form is "magus". There may have been twelve, but because three gifts were offered, three magi have become the tradition.

An early Christian text gave the men names: Melchior, Balthasar, and Caspar. During the middle ages people began to interpret them as representing the three known parts of the world—Europe, Asia, and Africa—and eventually they came to represent all people. Artists portrayed the *magi* as differing in ethnicity and age: Melchior as an old man; Balthasar a middle -aged man, sometimes with a dark beard; Caspar frequently as an elegant black youth. By the tenth century they were portrayed as kings in regal robes and crowns.

They are said to have come from the East, so they may have come from Persia, India or Mesopotamia. They might have lived twelve days journey away, but some believe it may have been more like a year long journey, especially riding camels through the desert up to 1,400 miles. The art works depicting them at the nativity scene are most likely inaccurate.

At the time of Jesus' birth, frankincense and myrrh were as familiar as gold and just as rare and precious. In Jesus' time, one pound of gold was worth about six hundred dollars and frankincense only slightly less. But myrrh was worth four thousand dollars a pound. Frankincense and myrrh are fragrant gum resins that come from trees. A single tree can produce about ten pounds of resin a year. Frankincense was placed on smoldering charcoal and burned slowly, releasing an exotic fragrance. The aroma was thought to be pleasing to the gods, so incense smoke became a means of communication between human and divine worlds. Myrrh was believed to cure everything from diaper rash to baldness. It was used externally to heal wounds and internally for fevers, digestive problems, and poisoning. It is still found today in tooth and gum care products.

There are many ideas about the choice of gifts for baby Jesus. One was that gold was given to the virgin to relieve her poverty; frankincense to dispel the bad odor of the stable; and myrrh to drive away vermin, such as worms. Another idea was that Gold was given as a tribute to Jesus as a king, Frankincense as an offering to Jesus as God, and myrrh as a predictor of Jesus' death. You can form your own ideas.

It has been said that if the wise men had been wise women instead, they would have asked for directions and arrived on time. They would have helped deliver the baby, cleaned the stable, and made a casserole. The gifts would have been more practical like diapers, lotion, and baby wipes. And, there would have been Peace on Earth!

### Council Minutes 12/12/2019

The Meeting was called to Order at 6:30 p.m.

The Christ Candle was lit and Tammy Dufeck offered the Opening Devotions.

Jennifer Manion made a motion to approve the agenda, amending the Spire Article due date to December 20<sup>th</sup>.

Kara seconded. Agenda was approved

Kara Hepp made a motion to approve the November minutes. Rachel seconded. Minutes were approved

Marsha proposed that the council appoint Paul Gruber to fulfill the vacant property council seat. A formal vote by the congregation will happen at the annual meeting.

Tammy seconded. Paul was approved as the new property chair.

Staff reports and most team reports were reviewed online prior to the meeting. It was noted that Shawna's email was incorrect on some of the email threads, so council should check the email thread they are responding too.

A brief report on Live Nativity was given – it was a great success with the most attendees recorded in the last six years (318 on Saturday plus Sunday morning). \$828 was collected for Harbor House. The money collected Sunday morning will be used for seed money for next year's Live Nativity.

We are still looking for people to fill the positions on

Youth, Education and Finance

Council brainstormed names and decided that having several people approach potential candidates would be a good strategy.

Stephens Ministry was discussed. Marcy Stoeckel has volunteered to sponsor up to four people to be trained to become trainers to bring this ministry to Long Lake Lutheran. This would help Pastor Sue with visitation and in supporting members of the congregation. Shawna has agreed to be trained with Marcy, and so far, we haven't found any other interested people. Tammy D. might be interested.

Kara Hepp talked about the Strategic Alignment session on January 4<sup>th</sup> that will help us better understand what different ministry areas are doing and how they should be aligned. Kara will be sending out some prework that should be completed before this session.

Staff reviews will be completed by Wednesday 12/19 – after that point, the budget will be sent to council via e-mail to be approved.

The 2020 budget was reviewed and discussed.\*

A council retreat was scheduled for March 14<sup>th</sup> to do some visioning for the next year.

Marsha W. agreed to serve as Council Rep for Christmas Day.

Tammy Dufeck noted that the youth meeting will be moved to 1/8 instead of 1/1 because of New Year's Day.

Marsha moved to adjourn the meeting at 7:52, the meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer. Jennifer M. seconded. The motion passed

The budget was approved via e-mail on 12/18














"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!"



When visitors come to our church for the first time, they often remark on the mural we have hanging in the Fellowship Hall. They wonder about the history and significance of the paintings that hang in such a prominent space in the church. This legacy of Long Lake was a gift from our former Pastor Paul Hammar.

Our congregation participated in a pastoral exchange in 1982 that sent our pastor, Paul Hammar, to Sweden and brought Pastor Stig Demker back here to preside at Long Lake. It was during his time in Sweden that Pastor Hammar and his wife, Carolyn, became friends with a well-renowned Swedish artist named Sven-Bertil Svennson and his wife, Anna. The two couples became fast friends and Pastor Hammar commissioned Svennson to paint something for his home church back in Isanti, Minnesota.

Long Lake was fortunate to receive this gift of three panels which depict Jesus, the Virgin Mary, and John the Baptist. Svennson's particular style of artwork has origins in the first century of the church. In these panels, Svennson focuses attention on the faces of Jesus, Mary, and John the Baptist. Other significant features of the panels include The Bible Jesus holds in one hand, which is open to Matthew 11:28. Come unto Me, all ye who are weak and heavy-laden, and I will give your rest. Other symbols include "IC" and "XC", which are early Christian depictions of "Icthus", the fish or the church. In the four corners of the panels you can find the four living creatures of Revelation; the lion, the ox, the man, and the eagle. Svennson includes many small but important Christian ideas and symbols throughout the three panels.

These panels are a treasured gift from a former pastor. They have hung in the Fellowship Hall since it was built in 2000 and will continue to be remembered and revered.

# A.A. Step By Step Step One

**STEP ONE** 

"Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs."

The results of a spiritual awakening are dramatic, although they may take place over a long period of time. They indicate changed perception, attitudes and behaviors. There are many definitions of a spiritual awakening. With each person the important meaning of it is that he has now become able to do, feel and believe that which he could not do before on his own strength. He finds himself in possession of a degree of peace of mind, honesty, tolerance and love he felt incapable of before. What he has received is a free gift. This gift lies in the practice of "ALL" the Twelve Steps in the program.

In the beginning of AA, Bill Wilson and Dr. Bob felt the only way they would stay "safe" was to "get active" and work with other alcoholics. They felt they must carry AA's message. That was the main reason the fellowship existed. AA is more than a set of principles; it is a society of recovered alcoholics in action. Twelfth Step work is one of the actions we take to stay in recovery. Our own faith is strengthened when we help another. Our message is one of hope, love, comfort, health. A better way of life. How can anyone argue with that? It works! How do we carry it out? In subtle, but powerful ways. We do our own recovery work and become living demonstrations of hope, self-love, comfort and health. These quiet behaviors send a powerful message. Our Higher Power will guide our actions to where we need to be to spread the message. If another person is helped, it is by the grace of God and not by what we say or do. And finally we strengthen our own faith and sobriety by doing Twelve Step work.

Action is the key word. We experience a kind of giving that asks no rewards. We begin to practice all Twelve Steps of the program in our daily lives to find emotional sobriety. This offers us a kind of love that has no price tag. Working with other alcoholics will insure immunity from drinking. This is what Bill Wilson realized when he founded AA; that nothing kept alcoholics sober better than another alcoholic. That is Twelve Step Work! Twelve Step Work is essential to keeping the AA Fellowship going. Twelve Step Work means to carry the message to those that still suffer.

Am I carrying the message by example or just giving advice? Have I experienced a spiritual awakening? How can I carry the message to my family members?


