

I am thankful for the many different women who have been mentors for me on my faith journey, and I am glad that all the young girls in our churches have never known a time when being a Pastor wasn't a possible career choice for them, or when the possibility of having a female mentor on their faith journey wasn't a far off possibility.

On June 29th, the ELCA marked an important anniversary – 50 years since the vote to ordain women. I was reflecting on some of the amazing women I have known over the years in ministry, and there have been many. In every congregation I have served, there has been at least one female pastor serving there as well. I have many female friends

who serve as pastors and I've met many other gifted female clergy over the years at camps, continuing education events and other gatherings. I have been blessed to call many of these women friends and mentors. When I was growing up in the church, I was given many leadership opportunities – and I had many people affirm my own gifts for leadership that encouraged me to seek out a vocation in the church. Never once did it occur to me that this wouldn't be an option for me because I was female.

My daughter has never been to a church that hasn't had at least one female Pastor. I remember a time several years ago when we were with a group of people and my daughter was talking about my colleague Jeanne, who was a Pastor at our church. It was time for my daughter's first communion and I remember that Kylie was doing a lot of planning and scheming to try to figure out how to make sure that she was in the group that was going to get communion from Pastor Jeanne that day, rather than one of the other Pastors on staff. All of the other Pastors that I worked with were delightful people, and Kylie liked them all, but she adored Jeanne. Kylie was telling everyone at this gathering how excited she was that Pastor Jeanne, who had baptized her, had also

wrote, "Worshiping God fills in the blank in the human brain in an utterly positive way." Worship should begin with a sense of awe. Under normal circumstances many people come to worship after a busy week at work, a busy week at home, with a busy mind and bringing with them a myriad of problems. They slide into their pew with more of a sense of relief. We should all take time to rest and meditate in awe before we begin to worship. "Be still, and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46: 10)

"Worship allows us to clear our minds of distractions, to concentrate on the biblical story about the acts of God, who calls us to worship." (Marty, p. 103) "In many ways worship, properly achieved, is the rest of life." (Marty p. 109) If we could think of worship as life, we would "Be" the church all day, every day, whether at work, at play or at home. We would bring the good from our once a week worship experience out into our 24/7 world. We would be transformed and our world would be transformed. "Be still, and know that I am God!"

God doesn't care whether we worship in a building, in our cars in the church parking lot, or at home by our computers. What God wants is your love and devotion in return for God's love and devotion. "Be still, and know that I am God!"

We made it to a warm and steamy July! Even though Covid has seemed to slow time to a crawl, I can't believe that we are halfway finished with 2020. It sure has been nice to worship with all of you that have been attending our parking lot services. I understand that it is quite



different than being inside our sanctuary, but I enjoy being able to worship with all of you in ways that include speaking and singing. In case you haven't heard, the reason we have chosen to worship in the parking lot is that the CDC has strict guidelines for indoor worship that require social distancing, no speaking, and no singing. Your council and staff did not feel that would be a welcoming worship experience, so we chose to worship outside. We are all so grateful for your patience during this time.

As we enter full swing into summer, I pray that all of you are able to keep attending and continue to give as you can (or till it feels good). Just like your household, Long Lake Lutheran has expenses that haven't stopped during Covid. During this time, givings have decreased in some areas. Back in March and April, the Executive Team was meeting weekly to trim expenses as best we can. We chose to reduce the mortgage payment for three months to the interest only; that helped us save over \$7,000 each month. Now that we are into July, we will begin making the minimum mortgage payment of \$5,700 again (we were paying \$7,500). With that being said, your givings are just as important now as they ever have been.

Even though things are different than what we are used to at Long Lake, we continue to try to find ways to be together while maintaining social distance. Your council and staff are coordinating and planning ways to continue being part of many activities that include Camp Onamia, outdoor meetings/ gatherings, and a food truck event on July 22 from 5-9. These are great opportunities to not only gather, but to get involved and serve
