From the desk of Pastor Sue

“God can do anything—far more than you could ever imagine or guess or request in your wildest dreams! He does it not by pushing us around but by working within us, his Spirit deeply and gently within us.”

Ephesians 3:20-21 (The Message)

What are your wildest dreams for this church? How do we grow? How do we attract new people and young families? That is the \$25,000 question that every church is asking. By October, our mortgage on our building built in 2000 will be paid off. Paid off! That is truly cause for celebration, and celebrate, we will! With that in mind, we need to be thinking ahead with positivity and openness to God’s work. I believe that we are poised for growth and greatness here at the crossroads of highway 47 and 277th Av NW, between Isanti and St. Francis. Both towns are growing in population and building new homes. There is no ELCA church in St. Francis. We also draw from a larger surrounding area, including East Bethel, Ramsey, Mora, and NowThen and more. We have a great message of salvation by grace alone. You have shown that you support ministry and education excellence.

We have a lot to think about in the ensuing months. We have done wonderful work in visioning. I truly believe God has work for us to do here in this location, but we have to know that things are not all rosy in the world around us. This will either deter us from growing, or spur us on to action. We can choose to do nothing and allow our assets to deteriorate to a point of no return, meaning sitting around watching our church decline to an eventual death with no action; we can fix up what we have and protect the status quo, or, we can have a grand vision for the future and look positively toward growth, rejuvenation, and renewal. It’s your call.

According to a headline on Gallup.com, March 29, 2021, “U.S. Church Membership Falls Below Majority for First Time”. Americans' membership in houses of worship continued to decline last year, dropping below 50% for the first time in Gallup's eight-decade trend. In 2020, 47% of Americans said they belonged to a church, synagogue or mosque, down from 50% in 2018 and 70% in 1999. U.S. church membership was 73% when Gallup first measured it in 1937 and remained near 70% for the next six decades, before beginning a steady decline around the turn of the 21st century.

The decline in church membership is primarily a function of the increasing number of Americans who express no religious preference. Over the past two decades, the percentage of Americans who do not identify with any religion has grown from 8% in 1998-2000 to 13% in 2008-2010 and 21% over the past three years. Many people will say they are “spiritual” and not “religious,” or they dis-

trust organized religion. The church has fallen in its favor as the place to socialize. There are so many more activities that pull people in a thousand different directions than those of us raised in the 50's and 60's or even earlier.

As would be expected, Americans without a religious preference are highly unlikely to belong to a church, synagogue or mosque. Church and/or denominational loyalty is near non-existent as people seek to fulfill different needs from different sources. Church membership is strongly correlated with age, as 66% of traditionalists -- U.S. adults born before 1946 -- belong to a church, compared with 58% of baby boomers, 50% of those in Generation X and 36% of millennials. The limited data Gallup has on church membership among the portion of Generation Z that has reached adulthood are so far showing church membership rates similar to those for millennials.

So what is a church in 2021 with a paid off mortgage supposed to do? Sit by and watch the decline and demise of the church. I adamantly say, absolutely not! The early church, which we just celebrated its beginning on Pentecost, was faced with difficulties, persecution, and conquering and warring factions.

But, think about it. If you were a new young family who moved into the area and were curious about getting your kids involved in Sunday School, Confirmation and Youth activities, what would you think about what we offer? I have had people ask which of the two buildings is the church; kids have had to keep their coats on during Sunday School in the Cornerstone because it is so cold; kids are sent to the "other" building while the adults use the newer building. What if you had a child that was differently abled and could not use stairs? How do we look to a visitor?

During the pandemic, I hope if you learned one thing, it is that the church is not a building, but rather, the worship of our Lord, and the spiritual care of our soul. The building, however, becomes important to us as we strive to plan meaningful worship, fellowship building activities, educational opportunities, and community involvement. It is a necessary element in growing God's kingdom in the 21st Century. How we appear to the outsider is way more critical to our success and growth than how we appear to ourselves. Comfort is not an option! May God bless us with vision, inspiration, and motivate us to action. I welcome your comments.

DIRECTOR OF YOUTH & FAMILY MINISTRY SHAUNA BERG



My daughter is passionately independent. Ever since she was a toddler she has wanted to “do it herself.”

Sometimes this is a good trait. It allows her to figure out ways to complete complex tasks and have a great sense of accomplishment when she does. Sometimes, this trait is a curse. She finds it very difficult to ask for help. I get frustrated sometimes, watching her try to complete a task and wishing she would just ask for help.

I worry about her and what this trait will mean for her as she gets older and her problems become a little more complex. I worry, and then I realize... she learned it from us. Both her dad and I have this same trait, so we have had to work hard to teach her that asking for and receiving help is an acceptable thing to do.

It reminds me of a joke I once heard about a man in a terrible flood. The waters were rising so he climbed onto the top of the roof and prayed to God to save him. A short while later a man in a rowboat came along and told him to come aboard. The man replied, “No, I prayed to God, and God will save me.” An hour or so later a man in a power boat came along and told him to come aboard. The man replied, “No, I prayed to God, and God will save me.” Finally, a helicopter came and dropped a rope to the man. The man refused, once again saying that he was waiting for God to save him.

The man drowned. When he got to heaven he asked God why He hadn't saved him from the flood. God replied, “I sent two boats and a helicopter – what more did you want?”

You see, we are called to be God's hands and feet in the world. Yet still I am reluctant to ask for or accept help from people even when I really need it. I pray about it, yet when the people in my life respond, I often don't let them help.

Sometimes it is actually because I am so overwhelmed I don't really know what I need or what they might be comfortable doing.

In the moments of great need, I've found it most helpful when someone offers specific help. For example, “I would love to bring you a meal – when would be the best time for me to do that?” This is so much easier to respond to than, “If you need anything, let me know.” It lets me know how they feel most comfortable helping and gives me something specific to respond to.

I also need to learn how to just say, “I can't do this on my own, I need your help.” When you ask for help, it is also helpful to ask for specific things. I've always found that people want to help. People want to be God's hands and feet in the world but most of the time we don't know what to do. Ask your friends, ask your families, and ask your church.

I can't tell you how many times I have heard stories where people have felt hurt by their church because they weren't visited in the hospital or helped through a difficult time and *their church never even knew what was going on*. Current privacy laws and rules mean that churches no longer get automatically informed when someone is admitted at a hospital. They cannot help you through it, or help connect you with resources, or even pray for you if they do not know.

We have to figure out how to be better at this for our own sake, as well as for our kids' sake. We are designed to be in community because we cannot do life alone – we need each other. God sends us help when we need it, and often we don't even recognize it.

How can you be the Hands and Feet of Christ to someone you know who needs it?

How can you be better at asking for help when you need it?

Staff Reports

Pastor Sue and Shawna submitted reports to the team. Shawna shared how she continues to become more and more technically knowledgeable due to our challenges. Pastor Sue asked if we could send Shawna's Dad a lap blanket from the Long Lake Lutheran family. His cancer has returned and he had to have another surgery a week ago. Shawna's family considers our church as their home church and enjoys watching online when we are not having technical difficulties. Pastor Sue would like to start Stephen Ministries. Team members will be Marcy Stoeckel, Pat Weiss, and Shawna Berg. The cost is approximately \$1600. A congregation member has offered to cover the cost. A green slip has been completed and this will be submitted to the Mission team.

Team Reports

Thanks to the teams who were able to send reports prior to meeting.

Worship/Music- Worship/Music team would like to begin with the purchase of 100 hymnals at the cost of \$2500 plus shipping and handling. We have asked congregation for sponsoring a hymnal in "honor or memory of". Pastor Sue shared that we have memorial money to supplement the purchase and shipping of the new hymnals. Team discussed and support that a "memorial fund" needs to be added as a line item. This was brought forward last month to the Finance team. No update available due to Dennis was not present.

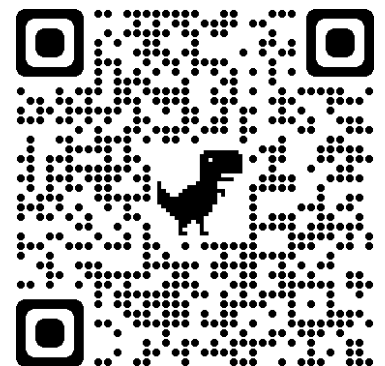
Creation Care started with Tiffany from Isanti Soil and Water speaking about the importance of keeping our surface water clean, and six steps we can do to keep the ground water clean.

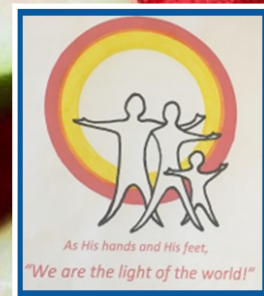

PROPERTY

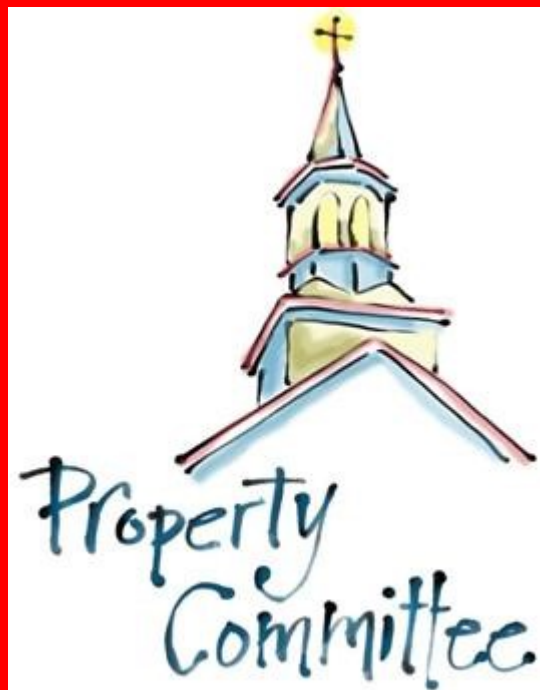

New Pathways' mission is to build a stronger community by providing shelter and support services to families with children experiencing homelessness. Supporting families is a team effort, which is why our Path to Home shelter chose a model that relies on hundreds of local volunteers. Our hope is to connect families with people and resources that will help them to be successful long term. We want to see families thrive, as opposed to just survive. This includes meals, a safe, warm place to sleep, and skills and resources necessary to find and maintain housing.

Margaret Burns and Cheryl Gray established New Pathways, Inc. in Cambridge, Minnesota in 2000 as an all-encompassing resource for families experiencing homelessness. The Cambridge Day Center was established in 2002, and New Pathways began partnering with area churches where homeless families could eat and spend the night. The house in Cambridge was purchased with the assistance of government funding and provided a place where families could search for housing and employment, get connected with community resources, do laundry, and take a shower. Staff was hired, including a Licensed Social Worker for family case management, which gave the program stability so it could provide the best service possible to the family participants.

In 2006, the program expanded to Little Falls before moving its second location to Brainerd. This location followed the same model as Cambridge, with families staying at churches in one-week rotations. New Pathways had been a part of the Brainerd community for over 10 years, providing shelter and services to 386 families in need. Due to unforeseen circumstances, the program abruptly stopped in 2019 due to rental space and funding loss.

The Cambridge location serves Chisago, Isanti, Kanabec, Mille Lacs, and Pine counties.

The shelter program is now called the "Path to Home Program," since it works with each family to create a plan for their unique path to housing stability. New Pathways has 40 church partners who volunteer at least 300 hours per week to make the program work. In 2010, New Pathways expanded to provide supportive housing services to long-term homeless families. New Pathways partnered with MetroPlains Management to provide support services to six long-term homeless families at Normandy Townhomes in Cambridge. In 2013, services expanded to cover four additional units at Heritage Townhomes in Cambridge. An on-site case manager is available full time to provide assistance in developing a strong tenant-landlord relationship and to connect the families with resources in the community.

A.A. Step By Step

Step Six

*were entirely ready to have God remove all
these defects of character*

This step asks us whether or not we are entirely willing to have God remove all these defects of our character. In other words, are we willing to behave differently from the way we have in the past? Are we willing to change ourselves and be changed? If we are not willing, we are faced again with self-will. We are once again insisting on our own way even if it is the destructive way.

Step Six is about willingness. We cannot remove our character defects without the help of our Higher Power. Some days we are more willing than others. We must constantly pray for willingness. The impossibility of achieving this Step perfectly, however, does not mean we should not try to do it as completely as we can.

This Step is the most difficult of all the Steps to take from a technical standpoint because of the words “entirely ready.” Almost no one is “entirely ready” to have his or her defects of character removed, or if you wish, our sins.

If we ask, God will certainly forgive us our transgressions but in no case does He render us white as snow and keep us that way without our cooperation. That is something we are supposed to be willing to work toward ourselves. He only asks that we do our best to the building of good character.

This is where we run into trouble. No matter how much we progress we make there is always that little white lie, that candy we can't pass up, the gossip we can't resist, and so it goes. There is always some point we just can't give up. What we must recognize now is that we exult in some of our defects. We really love them. We just look at them differently and then they seem OK.

Many wonder how Step Six can be worked. To do so would be perfection. Only Step One, where we made 100% admission of powerlessness over alcohol can be practiced with absolute perfection. The remaining eleven are goals to estimate our progress. Difficult but not impossible. Beginning-not the end.
