
From the desk of Pastor Sue:



You belong to God! That is wonderful news, but what do you do with that statement? How does belonging to God change your attitudes and behaviors? As Lutherans, we believe that we are saved by grace alone, not by works. There is nothing that we can do to earn God's favor. Everything was already done for us by Jesus when he took all sin upon himself, suffered and died on the cross. So, what do we do with that information? Once we know Jesus and what Jesus did for us; once we know how much God loves us, there must be something we can do in response. As long as we demonstrate God's love to others through our actions, behaviors, and comments, we are properly responding to our generous God. Commandment #1: You shall have no other gods. Luther wrote the meaning to that commandment, "you are to fear, love, and trust God above all things."

The fear intended here is not the fear we think of when we are running from a bear! This kind of fear is more of a reverence, a devotion to and admiration of. The love of God is obvious. It is not like the love you have for M & M's or Snickers; it is not like the love you have for reading or gardening. This is an "agape" love, a deep love beyond words. We are simply returning love that was first given to us. We can't match God's love, but we can certainly try. I invite you to try adding this to your prayers every day from now on: "Lord, I love you. Thank you for loving me." Dwell on that for a while and imagine what the powerful love of the heavenly Father can do for you. Imagine how God would feel if He heard you say that to Him? "Lord, I love you." There are some people who do not feel all that loved, and when they hear this for the first time, "God loves you. God. Loves. You!", they are astounded and emotionally moved. We are so thankful for God's love. Return the love.

Trust is the hardest part for us to follow, especially when Luther says, "above all things." We trust God when things are going pretty well for us; but, do we trust God all the time? Can we? There always seems to be a bit of us holding back, trusting in ourselves, others, our possessions, the world, the news, the politicians, the ones who speak the loudest. Trust God. Above. All. Things!



Because we belong to God, our time, treasure, and talents belong to God all week, every day. As good stewards, we understand that all we have comes from God; everything we are, everything we have belongs to God. All The Time! Whew! Everything? All the time? Stewardship is putting what we say in the creed into practice for the world. We acknowledge that we belong to God, and we acknowledge that everything we have belongs to God. And so, we respond by giving back our time, our talent, and our treasure. But, how much of our time, talent and treasure are we supposed to give to the church?

Prior to the 1800's most money raised for the church came from pew rentals and special appeals. That would be a reason to tell someone they were in your pew! They were actually in "your family's purchased pew!" Offering was begun to be collected weekly because most workers were paid weekly in cash. People began to put their offering in little sealed envelopes that were collected in offering plates or bags. The tithe came to prevalence during this period as an attractive source of funding for planning and budgeting. Tithing talk ebbed and flowed throughout the next century. It was biblical for the harvest, why not use it as biblical for a wage centered economy? Tithing is an Old Testament concept, functioning as a mark of being a member of the community of Israel. The New Testament is silent on the subject. Christ's only references to tithing are included in warnings against religious hypocrisy. The radical nature of God's kingdom, when considered with Christ as Lord over all, is a call to acknowledge that it ALL belongs to God for God's work! We cannot separate our money from God's money. Tithing is not an obligation; it is a privilege!

If we think about running out of money in the church, and are worried constantly about the weekly contributions, the bills to be paid, and the annual budget, rather than trusting God in everything, we have a scarcity mindset, and our prophecy will probably be fulfilled. If we are tight-fisted in our giving, we will be constantly watching the checkbook, and hosting fear. However, if we trust God fully, we can be grateful for all the great work God is going to accomplish here through us and our stewardship of our time, talent and treasure, and we will Never Run Out! We will be active participants in God's activity! We will think grander; we will plan for an abundant future; we will celebrate how our time, talent and treasure has done so much good for God's kingdom.

Summer is upon us. June, July, and August typically see a downward trend in attendance at church and in giving. What if, this year, we shared abundantly, we worshipped often and grandly, we praised openly, we prayed constantly and we trusted fully? What if? Make a commitment to God. Promise to worship God in God's house on a regular basis. Continue your financial support even when you are not physically present. We have many online giving options for you and snail mail still works! God's love and attention never stops! Why should our love and attention for God take a break? "I love you Lord, thanks for loving me!"


From the desk of Shawna Berg:

Our 2022 Summer Theme is: "Seen, Known, Loved"


Join us for a Summer of rest and renewal: a road trip through Exodus, with the map of Luke.

Antipasto Squares

INGREDIENTS

Cooking spray

2 (8-oz.) tubes crescent dough

1/2 lb. deli ham

1/4 lb. pepperoni

1/2 lb. sliced provolone

1/4 lb. sliced mozzarella

1 c. (16-oz.) jar sliced pepperoncini

2 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil

1/4 c. freshly grated Parmesan

1 tsp. dried oregano

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350° and grease a 9"-x-13" baking sheet with cooking spray. Place one unrolled can of crescents on prepared baking sheet and pinch together seams. Layer ham, pepperoni, provolone, mozzarella, and pepperoncini.

Unroll remaining tube of crescent dough and place on top of pepperoncini. Pinch together seams to seal.

Brush oil all over top of crescent dough, then sprinkle with Parmesan and oregano.

Bake until dough is golden and cooked through, about 35 minutes. (If dough is browning too quickly, cover with foil.)

Let cool at least 15 minutes before slicing into squares.
