From the desk of Pastor Sue...

One wouldn't normally look to the book of Lamentations for a word of hope and expectation. It is traditionally seen as a moving and emotional lament for the destruction of Jerusalem by the Babylonians in 586 BCE. But in this season of "thanks" giving, of celebrating the birth of the Savior, and of looking forward with 20/20 vision for the future of Long Lake Lutheran, I found a passage in Lamentations to share:

- The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end;
- ²³ they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.
- ²⁴ "The Lord is my portion," says my soul,
 "therefore I will hope in him." Lamentations 3:22-24 (NRSV)

We have been richly blessed in so many ways and our church is one of the few rural ELCA churches that is thriving and growing. If I listed all of our active ministries here at LLLC, and all of the ways we reach beyond our walls, this Spire would be 25 pages long! We were never promised an easy road in our walk of discipleship, but you are putting in a great and enduring effort. Praise God!

On **Friday, November 1**st **at 1:30 pm**, Anne Gerriets of the ELCA Mission Investment Fund is doing a free consultation walk through of our buildings and property. ²⁴ For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? ²⁵ But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

²⁶ Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. ²⁷ And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

Director of Youth and Family Ministry Shownot Berg



I grew up as a military brat, which means as a young child I moved around a bit. However, for most of my growing up years we were stationed in a small community in Southern Arizona. I was fortunate enough to be a part of two different faith communities while growing up there, and both of them had a profound impact on my faith journey and my decision to stay active in the church as an adult.

A couple of years ago the Fuller Institute put out a book called "Sticky Faith." This book did some extensive research of churched youth to find out what the difference was between those who stayed involved in the church in college and beyond, and those who had fallen away from their church after being very connected as youth.

One of the strongest indicators for students who stayed involved and connected continuously was that they had been involved in intergenerational worship and intergenerational ministries in their home congregations. This resonated with me.

The first church we attended was in an old military chapel on the base. We had a large chapel on the base that held a protestant service at one hour, and a catholic service at another hour. At the time we were living there our Chaplain happened to be Lutheran, and he decided to do an additional service at a tiny chapel after the other protestant service for anyone who wanted to attend.

My parents had both been raised Lutheran and thought this would be a great opportunity for us. There were 40 of us who attended services in this old WWII chapel. There was no Christian education opportunity as we just weren't big enough. Every family took turns hosting the fellowship hour following worship. When you hosted you brought the treats (sometimes you bought donuts, sometimes you baked... it was always delicious!). The fellowship time often lasted longer than the service.

Everyone knew everyone by name. The church felt safe to me and was a place I wanted to be. If you weren't there, you were likely to get a phone call from someone to make sure you were okay. This place was a great example of community, and sharing, and learning.

When I entered junior high, my parents and the pastor began talking about Confirmation. Confirmation is an important ritual in the Lutheran tradition, and I was the only one of that age in this tiny congregation. I learned that my parents had decided it might be best if we went to the Lutheran church in town, so that I might begin Confirmation instruction. I was devastated. That church seemed huge to me (they had about 250 people). I didn't know anyone there.

On my first day of confirmation class, we were asked to choose a mentor from the congregation. Each student had a name that came to their mind immediately, and I began to cry. I didn't know anyone – how could I choose? I was paired up with the intern pastor, because he was new too! I didn't know it at the time, but that relationship would end up being very influential to me.

I quickly made friends, and learned that the 13 kids in my confirmation class were great people, and the people in my youth group were some of my favorite people I met in junior high and high school.

However, what was even more special to me were the relationships I made with everyone else in worship. I learned that even in a congregation of 250, there were people who noticed I was gone. There were ladies in the choir who sought me out each week to say hello and give me a hug, and when I decided I wanted to sing in worship (and didn't do so great) they encouraged me to keep singing, until it became something I loved and could do well. I felt like I was valued, and I was important.

We didn't have flashy music, we didn't have great youth ministry programs – but I knew I was loved, and I experienced God's love in that church. When I went off to college, I couldn't wait to come home and visit my church family. Sierra Lutheran Church inspired me to choose ministry as a vocation and will always hold a special place in my heart.

I have always chosen to have my children in worship too. They participate in the Christian education opportunities for their ages in addition to us finding worship times during which we can all be together.

We do a great disservice to our youth when we keep them in age-specific programming and then, when they have "aged" out of such programming, we expect them to go to worship. Why would they? It is all foreign to them. They don't know what to expect, why we do it, and they have rarely experienced the beauty that can be found in that kind of intergenerational community.

Worshiping with kids is hard, I get it. It is especially hard when you have small children. However, the payout is worth it. Thanks mom and dad for bringing me to worship, and thanks to the worshiping communities that put up with goldfish in the pews, loud "whispers," giggling teenagers, and occasional outbursts in the name of loving Jesus and each other.

I promise it is worth it. In the spirit of continuing to find ways to make worship a welcome space for our young people – you may see changes. Thanks to a generous donation we will be putting in place a "PrayGround" space in the front of the sanctuary where parents can sit with their young children and allow them to be more fully engaged in the worship experience. We have been working with the worship team on Wednesday nights to work to make that service more engaging for the teenagers that make up much of that worshiping community. This is so important because our young people are not only the future of the church, but they are a big part of our church now, and we want them to feel valued and important!

So the next time you see a young person in church, thank them for being there, and thank whoever it is that brought them there for continuing to make that effort! It takes a village, and we have a great one here!

A wise person once told me: "In order to tell a story, someone needs to be willing to listen." Sometimes we are the storyteller and sometimes we are the listener. I prefer to be the listener more often than the storyteller. I love to hear about people's lives, the things they have seen, the lessons they have learned, and the people they have met. I take their stories and cherish them. I love reading about others peoples stories also. My favorite parts of the Bible are when Jesus tells stories, or parables, about life lessons. I get so involved in all aspects of those stories too. There is always one character I can identify with and understand.

At times I am required to be the storyteller. I am not always good at telling my own story, but I enjoy repeating stories of others. Especially my kids. I love to tell about them. We did not know what to expect or who was going to be here.

Our son Greg was about 6 years old and we came to church one Sunday. Greg sat next to us and played with some cars he had found in one of those cute bags. He settled in and we started to listen. Pastor Andrew Prin was preaching that day. He preached on John 3:16. Now I didn't know a lot about Jesus, faith, or God's unconditional love for me.

Here was this young pastor telling me that God loved me so much that he sent his Son to die for me. He also did it wearing a rainbow clown wig! He did it holding a cardboard sign! He was showing how sometimes you see people in sports stadiums holding signs and wearing a wig. They didn't care how ridiculous they looked, and we should either. We need to spread the Good News, at all costs. We need to share our story and God's story.

Brian and I looked at each other and we knew this is where we wanted to be. A place where we could feel welcomed, loved, and accepted. Even when there is a clown wig on a pastor!

That was 17 years ago and I can still see him standing in front of the church wearing that wig and holding that sign! Since then, I have had numerous roles in the church. Sunday school teacher, softball coach, I have been in the live Nativity, served food, and many other things. Maybe you have done some of those things too. Maybe you are looking for some other way to help our church.

We are still looking for that person to be the education chair. I am sure God is whispering in someone's ear to step up. Being the education chair the past 3 years has deepened my faith, strengthened my relationships, and expanded my knowledge of our church. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time as your council rep and I am also sure that you will also.

Thanks You Lord!





What great books have you read lately?



A. Step By Step Step Ten

Step 11

"Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with god as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out"

Our sobriety depends on the maintenance of our spiritual condition. The powerlessness over our addiction that nearly destroyed us will return if we do not work on maintaining contact with our Higher Power. Prayer and meditation are our principal means of conscious contact with God. It is through these channels we reestablish our desire to do God's will. A handy distinction that is often made between prayer and meditation is that prayer is talking to God, mediation is listening. We must ask God to reveal his will for us but then we must listen for the answer.

We came into the program seeking help for our addictions. Many find the spiritual peace they didn't realize they were seeking. After some time in the program it begins to dawn on most AA members that the program is a spiritual program and through the steps they can find the way to spiritual peace. Many come into the program angry and estranged from God and find their way back through working the steps.

Step Eleven talks about praying only for knowledge of God's will for us and the power to carry that out. The work 'only' serves as a reminder to take our will out of the equation. How do we recognize the will of our Higher Power? Many of us become aware during those quiet, still moments during meditation when our minds are clear from distraction. We can connect with our Higher Power in many ways: through nature on a walk in the woods, listening to music, or sitting quietly with our eyes shut. We can repeat the Serenity Prayer throughout the day. We don't have to do it perfectly; we just have to do it willing.

What exactly is meditation? The dictionary says it means "to think contemplatively". When I look up 'contemplate' it means, "to view thoughtfully." When we awake, we should consider our plans for the day. Before we begin, we ask God to direct our thinking, perhaps read some meditation books or scripture and then just sit quietly and let our Higher Power work within us. Upon retiring, we constructively review our day. Do we owe anyone an apology? Were we loving and kind? What could we have done differently? Were we thinking of ourselves or others? After taking inventory of our behavior for the day and we inquire what corrective measures should be taken, we ask for God's forgiveness.

Of course we cannot work Step Eleven perfectly nor can we ever be done working this step. If we have truly worked all the eleven steps to the best of our ability we have developed a true spiritual basis for living. That basis is humility; putting God's will before our own.
